4. Define the following words or terms. Note for each of them how understanding the meaning and background of that word better helped you understand this passage, and why you think this word was chosen.

--"Hear" (Proverbs 1:8)

--"forsake" (Proverbs 1:8)

--"loves" (Proverbs 13:24)

--"Train" (Proverbs 22:6)

--"fully trained" (Luke 6:40)

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5. Is God commanding the use of a rod and physical discipline (Proverbs 13:24)? Please explain.

6. What New Testament passage comes from these Proverbs? What more do we learn from the New Testament passage about what the Proverb is teaching?

7. Read the footnote to Proverbs 22:6. How does this literal reading change the meaning of this proverb?

8. EXTRA CREDIT: Proverbs 29:15 refers to "reproof". Look into the New Testament and find a passage showing us on what we base this reproof. (Note how you found this passage.)

9. What do these proverbs tell us about our relationship with God as Father?
